Lesson: Sin can have consequences. Those men represented some of the residual, ongoing consequences from Lot's sin, meaning that incestuous sin was still creating problems for the people in Jerusalem some 14.5 centuries after it was first committed.

Both Sanballat and Tobiah used two defensive mechanisms in response to what Nehemiah was attempting to do in Jerusalem.
The first defensive mechanism that Sanballat used is called
