Definition: Capitalism is an economic system where material goods and capital (capital could exist in the form of financial assets, real estate, a skill set, tenure, intellectual property, and copyrights, etc.) and the means for creating material goods and capital are owned and controlled by private _____ and or _____ competing together in a free market.

Definition: Socialism is an economic system where material goods and capital and the means for creating material goods and capital are owned and controlled by the _____ as a whole in a collective sense usually **through a centralized government** rather than through individuals and private companies.

Definition: Communism is an economic and **political** system where material goods and capital and the means for creating material goods and capital is both **government** _____ and government _____.

- All communists are socialists; but, not all socialists are communists (yet) because socialism is a _____ economic system. Socialism is the transitional stage between the overthrow of capitalism and the realization of communism.
